

MIDWEEK OF LENT 5

PONTIUS PILATE

Pontius Pilate, a witness to Christ, consented to order Jesus' execution. Pilate may wash his hands and proclaim his own innocence in the death of Jesus, but Pilate is guilty. Pilate is caught between a rock and a hard place. Instead of doing what is right, Pilate has Jesus' flesh ripped, shredded, dressed in purple, and crowned with thorns. His hard heart is complicit in the death of Christ. While it may be an uncomfortable thought, Pilate's failures make us examine our own complicity in the evil of others. How have we deceived ourselves in proclaiming innocence? How have we been pressured into allowing evil to occur? Thanks be to God that our journey to the cross shows us Jesus' forgiveness.

Opening Sentences

P: O Lord, open my lips,

C: and my mouth will declare Your praise.

P: Make haste, O God, to deliver me;

C: make haste to help me, O Lord.

ALL: Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen. Praise to You, O Christ, Lamb of our salvation.

Psalm 109

P: Help me, O LORD my God!

C: Save me according to Your steadfast love!

P: Be not silent, O God of my praise!

C: For wicked and deceitful mouths are opened against me, speaking against me with lying tongues.

P: They encircle me with words of hate,

C: and attack me without cause.

P: In return for my love they accuse me,

C: but I give myself to prayer.

P: So they reward me evil for good,

C: and hatred for my love.

P: Appoint a wicked man against him;

C: let an accuser stand at his right hand.

P: When he is tried, let him come forth guilty;
C: let his prayer be counted as sin!

P: May this be the reward of my accusers from the LORD,
C: of those who speak evil against my life!

P: But You, O GOD my Lord,
C: deal on my behalf for Your name's sake; because Your steadfast love is good, deliver me

P: For I am poor and needy,
C: and my heart is stricken within me.

P: I am gone like a shadow at evening;
C: I am shaken off like a locust.

P: My knees are weak through fasting;
C: my body has become gaunt, with no fat.

P: I am an object of scorn to my accusers;
C: when they see me, they wag their heads.

P: Help me, O LORD my God!
C: Save me according to Your steadfast love!

P: Let them know that this is Your hand;
C: You, O LORD, have done it!

P: Let them curse, but You will bless!
C: They arise and are put to shame, but Your servant will be glad!

P: May my accusers be clothed with dis-honor;
C: may they be wrapped in their own shame as in a cloak!

P: With my mouth I will give great thanks to the LORD;
C: I will praise Him in the midst of the throng.

P: For He stands at the right hand of the needy,
C: to save him from those who condemn his soul to death.

ALL: Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen.

P: Help me, O LORD my God!
C: Save me according to Your steadfast love!

Silence for reflection

Psalm Prayer:

P: O God of steadfast love and mercy, on the cross Your Son forgave His enemies. Turn our hearts from hatred and evil that we may forgive the offenses of those who seek our harm and forgive as we have been forgiven.

Rescue us in our time of peril and deliver us from bitterness and resentment; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

First Reading: Ezekiel 11:17–21

P: A reading from Ezekiel, the eleventh chapter.

“Therefore say, ‘Thus says the Lord GOD: I will gather you from the peoples and assemble you out of the countries where you have been scattered, and I will give you the land of Israel.’ And when they come there, they will remove from it all its detestable things and all its abominations. And I will give them one heart, and a new spirit I will put within them. I will remove the heart of stone from their flesh and give them a heart of flesh, that they may walk in My statutes and keep My rules and obey them. And they shall be My people, and I will be their God. But as for those whose heart goes after their detestable things and their abominations, I will bring their deeds upon their own heads, declares the Lord GOD.”

P: O Lord, have mercy on us.

C: Thanks be to God.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:1–6

P: A reading from Second Corinthians, the fourth chapter.

Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart. But we have renounced disgraceful, underhanded ways. We refuse to practice cunning or to tamper with God’s word, but by the open statement of the truth we would commend ourselves to everyone’s conscience in the sight of God. And even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled only to those who are perishing. In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus’ sake. For God, who said, “Let light shine out of darkness,” has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

P: O Lord, have mercy on us.

C: Thanks be to God.

Third Reading: John 19:1–16

P: A reading from St. John, the nineteenth chapter.

Then Pilate took Jesus and flogged Him. And the soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on His head and arrayed Him in a purple robe. They came up to Him, saying, “Hail, King of the Jews!” and struck Him with their hands. Pilate went out again and said to them, “See, I am bringing Him out to you that you may know that I find no guilt in Him.” So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, “Behold the man!” When the chief priests and the officers saw Him, they cried out, “Crucify Him, crucify Him!” Pilate said to them, “Take Him yourselves and crucify Him, for I find no guilt in Him.” The Jews answered him, “We have a law, and according to that law He ought to die because He has made Himself the Son of God.” When Pilate heard this statement, he was even more afraid. He entered his headquarters again and said to Jesus, “Where are You from?” But Jesus gave him no answer. So Pilate said to Him, “You will not speak to me? Do You not know that I have authority to release You and authority to crucify You?” Jesus answered him, “You would have no authority over Me at all unless it had been given you from above. Therefore he who delivered Me over to you has the greater sin.”

From then on Pilate sought to release Him, but the Jews cried out, “If you release this man, you are not Caesar’s friend. Everyone who makes himself a king opposes Caesar.” So when Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus out and sat down on the judgment seat at a place called The Stone Pavement, and in Aramaic Gabbatha. Now it was the day of Preparation of the Passover. It was about the sixth hour. He said to the Jews, “Behold your King!” They cried out, “Away with Him, away with Him, crucify Him!” Pilate said to them, “Shall I crucify your King?” The chief priests answered, “We have no king but Caesar.” So he delivered Him over to them to be crucified.

P: O Lord, have mercy on us.

through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and
the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
